## **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

#### Dear Friends:

I am pleased to present the Annual Report of Canadian Parents for French – BC & Yukon Branch for 2002-03.

We are particularly pleased to have our Annual General Meeting in Whitehorse this year, as the Yukon continues to be a national leader in French immersion and core French programs.

#### CPF and FSL flourish

The past year has been one of continuing progress for our organization and for French-second-language education in BC and the Yukon. Consider the following:

• In 2002-03, there were 31,990 students enrolled in French immersion in BC – an all-time record and one we expect to break in 2003-04. Yukon has doubled Kindergarten enrolment this year and is building towards a stronger future as we work to bring late French immersion to the Whitehorse area.

• As a direct result of Branch and Chapter advocacy, six new French immersion programs were launched in September 2003 (New Westminster, Salmon Arm, Quesnel, Prince Rupert, Vernon and Pitt Meadows) – the largest one-year increase in French immersion access in BC since the 1980s. We continue to pursue new programs in communities such as Terrace, Kitimat, Mackenzie, Princeton, Fraser Lake, Williams Lake, 100 Mile House and many more.

• By September 2004, SFU will have launched its bilingual program, *Éducacentre* will have started its new French-language community college and CPF-BC & Yukon will have implemented its partnership with the University of Ottawa to provide scholarships to BC and Yukon French-second-language students.

• The Dion Plan was announced this past March. The plan will expand annual federal funding for French immersion by 80% starting in March 2004. CPF-BC & Yukon played a key role in advocating for this initiative and I was proud on your behalf to join Minister Stéphane Dion at McRoberts Secondary School as he made the announcement.

His Excellency John Ralston Saul met with students and parents in Penticton, Kelowna and Vernon in November and demonstrated once again his strong personal connection with CPF.
CPF-BC & Yukon continues to lead the country in membership, programs and events for students, Chapter activity and support, and media attention for our message.

#### Chapters – Our Number One Priority

In short, it has been a terrific year for CPF-BC & Yukon, our Chapters and members. Some of the highlights follow. • CPF-BC & Yukon has more than 5,200 members organized in 47 Chapters. It continues to be our goal to reach 6,000 by

the end of our current agreement in March 2004.
As a board, our first priority has been support of Chapter activities. Over the past year, this support has taken several forms. CPF-BC & Yukon Chapters received 80% of membership money throughout 2002-03. During the present membership drive, we have increased the Chapter share to 90% in order to give Chapters more resources to achieve their goals.

• We also supplemented provincial socio-cultural funds to support even more Chapter activities in the past school year.

• Our staff and board have worked tirelessly to support Chapter advocacy efforts. Whether it is bussing in Terrace or Comox, class configuration in Burns Lake, the creation of new programs in Vernon, Salmon Arm or Whitehorse, the establishment of French Advisory Committees in Langley or New Westminster or working to maintain a popular program location in Mission, the CPF-BC & Yukon Provincial Office has been there working with you and on your behalf.

• During last fall's municipal elections in BC and territorial election in the Yukon, our Branch office and Chapters combined to send out questionnaires to candidates and political parties. This raised the profile of our issues and revealed the strong support of candidates from all walks of life for language education.

• Our briefs to the provincial and federal governments on rural education, graduation requirements and the Dion Plan ensured that French-second-language education and expansion of school choice remain priorities for our governments.

Finally, the *Théâtre de la Seizièmel* Terasen/CPF-BC & Yukon tour brought outstanding theatre last spring to the interior of British Columbia. And our partnership with the Canadian Club gave Lower Mainland students access to first-rate public speakers in French.

#### Contribution Agreement with Canadian Heritage

CPF-BC & Yukon is presently in the second year of a twoyear Contribution Agreement with the Department of Canadian Heritage. In their evaluation of our operations earlier this year, the Department described CPF-BC & Yukon as delivering an "outstanding level of service."

It was an honor for CPF and Chapters across BC and the Yukon to take part in a conference call with the Honorable *Continued on page 2*

Sheila Copps, Minister of Canadian Heritage, in March along with senior officials of the department. The Minister's participation was an acknowledgement of the extraordinary efforts of CPF-BC & Yukon parent-volunteers in pursuing the goals of linguistic duality.

Our present agreement with Canadian Heritage currently expires on March 31, 2004. CPF National and CPF Provincial Branches are presently negotiating a 5-year agreement that will ensure a stable level of funding for our organization through the 2008-09 fiscal year. Adrian Dix, CPF-BC & Yukon Executive Director, is on the National Negotiating Committee for this agreement on behalf of CPF National and Provincial sections.

We wish to thank Linda Johnston, Chris Natuik, Angelina Munaretto, Hilaire Lemoine, and Liliane Lê of Canadian Heritage for their ongoing support and generosity. And a special thanks to the Honorable Sheila Copps who has contributed so much to linguistic duality as Minister of Canadian Heritage.

#### Partnerships

CPF-BC & Yukon is proud of its partnerships. These partnerships bring greater force to our advocacy and new opportunities to French immersion and core French students. As a result, more than 50 French immersion students took part in the Francophone Youth Parliament and the Francophone Games, 500 parents took advantage of French for Parents classes, 200 young people in BC and another 60 in the Yukon took part in French for the Future, 800 young people and adults went to BC Family French Camp, 150 young historians wrote the Begbie History Contest in French, 120 Lower Mainland students attended Canadian Club luncheons in French and several thousand young people saw *Théâtre de la Seizième* in the BC interior. This does not include exchanges, contests, sociocultural events and tournaments — the list simply goes on and on.

#### Yukon

It was a great year for our Whitehorse Chapter. We were proud to support the Yukon's participation at the *National Concours d'Art Oratorie* in Toronto. CPF again, through partnerships with the Yukon's Francophone community, helped provide summer camps for French immersion and core French students. Sabine Schweiger and her team are preparing what should be a terrific AGM and Conference. And together we are working with the Yukon government to bring late French immersion to Whitehorse. If we succeed, the Yukon could be the first jurisdiction in Canada to double the number of bilingual graduates under the Dion Plan.

#### Concours d'Art Oratoire and Rencontre Française

In April, the 2003 *Concours* at Kwantlen College in Surrey was another great success with more than 700 participants, volunteers, judges, parents and supporters. It is so gratifying for me to appreciate not just the quality of French at *Concours*, but the power of ideas expressed by the students. Our thanks go out to our Chief Judge Joanne Neveux of Abbotsford, the French Consulate and all of our volunteers.

For the first time in almost a decade, CPF National organized a national *Concours* held at Glendon College in Toronto. Our Branch sponsored four students from BC and the Yukon to go to Toronto. Tamara Slade of Port Coquitlam (Immersion category) and Rebecca Soquier of Vancouver (Francophone category) each finished second in Canada.

Susan Asaph did a remarkable job as our *Concours* coordinator again this year. This was Susan's third year as coordinator and she has decided to step down and become the Chapter president in Abbotford. Thank you Susan for your energy, humor and commitment.

*Rencontre Française* also tied an attendance record with 175 *Continued on page 3* 

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*moniteurs* and students taking part during May at Simon Fraser University in Burnaby. Freda Heinrichs again did a great job as the coordinator for this signature CPF-BC & Yukon event. Thank you Freda and a wonderful team of *moniteurs* from all over BC led by Port Alberni Nathalie Ladouceur-Thomas.

#### Communications - Newsletter, Website and Media

Karynn Oxley is simply the finest newsletter editor anywhere. She continues to do an exceptional job producing the *CPF-BC & Yukon News.* And our website, *www.cpf.bc.ca* under the direction of Laurelle Keashly, is a constantly up-dated and valued source of information for our members, supporters and the general public. We set records for web visits in March and April and subsequently broke them in September. Thank you Laurelle and Karynn!

CPF-BC & Yukon's media profile as a source of information on French immersion and core French education in BC continues to grow. In January, a CPF press release made the front page of the *Vancouver Sun*. In March, a full hour of CBC Almanac was devoted to CPF and its issues. BCTV covered prominently CPF-BC & Yukon events. And CPF board, staff and volunteers were featured in dozens of local media – television, print and radio – over the past year.

We also distributed almost a thousand posters across BC with the themes "I'm learning French because" and "I'm staying in French because" that presently adorn bulletin boards in schools and community centers in every community where we have Chapters.

#### **Scholarships**

Annamarie Sember of Merritt and Nadine Evans of Castlegar were the winners of the CPF-BC & Yukon Bursary this year. Annamarie will be teaching in Merritt and Nadine has found a job in the French immersion program in Vanderhoof. We had a record number of applications this year and Sherry Taylor, who chairs our Scholarship Committee, had a difficult job in making a recommendation from such a fine group of candidates.

#### **Board of Directors**

Our Board had a busy year with four full board meetings, another eight board teleconference calls, participation in Presidents and Vice Presidents meetings, daily e-mails among ourselves, CPF members and the Executive Director, all in support of Chapter efforts.

CPF has never been stronger financially and in terms of membership, credibility and dynamism. I know I speak for all Board members when I say that this is a record of achievement that everyone in CPF – Board, staff, Chapter executive, members and parents – can be proud.
