CPF was founded in 1977 by parents who wanted to ensure that children would have the opportunity to become bilingual in the Canadian school system.

Originally a small group of concerned parents who met in Ottawa, CPF has evolved into a proactive national network with 10 Branch offices and some 150 Chapters in communities nationwide.

Canadian Parents for French is a nationwide, research-informed, volunteer organization that represents 25,000 members across Canada and champions the opportunity to learn and use French for all those who call Canada home.

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
Key Highlights

- Through the year, CPF BC & YK Chapters worked hard to organize opportunities for children and families to learn and practice their French and to celebrate Francophone culture. At the Branch level, office staff met with representatives from 19 Chapters and provided various other forms of support to Chapters and volunteers across the region.
- Over 65 Chapter delegates and guests attended the AGM & Conference in Kelowna. This highprofile event alowed Chapter volunteers to network, learn and share ideas while also helping reconnect past Branch Leaders with the organization.
- In the Spring of 2017 the Vancouver School Board cut one quarter of its French Immersion program. CPF BC & YK was quick to respond, working with families to mount a full-scale grassroots campaign, which included letter writing, media mobilization and securing the support of key decision makers. After a challenging effort, the Vancouver School Board reversed the cuts.
- During the year, CPF BC & YK continued to build a very positive and collaborative working relationship with the Minister and his team at the Ministry of Education.

Concours d'art oratoire

May 7, 2017

On May 7, 2017, CPF BC & YK Hosted the 37th Annual Provincial Concours d'art oratoire. After an estimated 10,000 French Immersion, Core French, and Francophone students participated across BC at the classroom, school, school district and provincial levels, 260 students gathered at SFU Surrey to take part in the provincial finals. Special partner guests included the French Consulate, BAFF, Conseil Jeunesse, and BCCLA. This year also marked the third year initiative focused on recruiting VIP judges so as to increase the profile, the community participation, and the quality of Concours.

This year's provincial finals were a success, with 76% of students surveyed indicating a greater appreciation for French language and culture and 88% of students indicating enthusiasm for the activity and a desire to see it repeated again. Concorus also garnered 29 media mentions, raising awareness of CPF, its activities and the importance of FSL education beyond the participants and audience.

We congratulate all the young people who took part in this year's Concours d'art oratoire, bravo pour votre participation!











Responding to Program Cuts in Vancouver

Throughout the year

French teacher shortage is the single greatest challenge CPF faces as an organization to fulfilling its mandate, i.e. to promote and support all young students to use and learn French. In the Spring of 2017, the Vancouver School Board (VSB) used the French teacher shortage to justify cutting one quarter of its phenomenally popular and over-subscribed French Immersion program. This was one of the greatest assaults on the accessibility of French programs in BC that had been seen in at least a decade, which could set a dangerous precedent across the region and across Canada. When it became clear that the VSB had no intention of reversing the cuts, CPF BC & YK mounted a full-scale grassroots campaign.

CPF BC & YK met with VSB Superintendent Scott Robinson, wrote five (5) open letters and two (2) media releases that generated strong regional media coverage (17 media mentions) and received strong support from key partners and allies. MP John Aldag spearheaded a letter writing campaign amongst BC Liberal MPs, and the FFCB put out a statement condemning the cuts.

Parents and families were integral to the campaign, and CPF BC & YK worked hard to engage and mobilize affected parents. The Branch hosted two (2) meetings and collaborated with three (3) local Francophone associations to assist the Branch in educating parents and influencing decision makers. During the by-election called by the Minister of Education in the Fall of 2017, parents worked to make the FI cuts a key election issue. Through their hard work, every candidate running for VSB Trustee proclaimed they would reverse the FI cuts.

CPF BC & YK also received extensive support from across Canada and from past CPF BC & YK Board Leaders. Ultimately, the Vancouver School Board reversed the cuts (100 of 135 spaces). As a result, 150 more students will be able to participate in French Immersion every year. However, the waiting lists that existed before the cuts remain, indicating a continued need for awareness-raising and advocacy at the local and provincial levels.

CPF BC & YK hosted its Annual General Meeting and Conference in Kelowna on September 29 & 30th. Over 65 Chapter delegates and guests attended this high-profile event. Held at the Grand Okanagan Resort and Conference Centre in downtown Kelowna, on beautiful Lake Okanagan, this was an opportunity to thank Chapter representatives for their on-going support and allowed volunteers from all four corners of our region to connect with one another. Delegates were able to meet and exchange ideas with fellow Chapters; get up-to-date information about Branch initiatives; and learn cutting-edge approaches to member recruitment, advocacy and fundraising.

On Friday night, conference attendees were treated to a special welcome dinner and tour at Mission Hill Winery in West Kelowna. Participants arrived to a spectacular sunset and reception under the iconic archway in the courtyard. Dinner was an exceptional feast, highlighting foods of the region and expertly paired with Mission Hill's finest wines. It was a lovely evening of memorable speeches, good conversation and a celebration that won't soon be forgotten.

In addition to presenting the annual report and tending to organizational business, the event offered an opportunity to welcome a number of Legacy Supporters and Distinguished Guests (i.e. MLA Norm Letnick); and offer leadership training sessions on subjects such as Volunteer Recruitment, Membership Development, Branding, and CPF's history.

This was one of the best AGM & Conferences hosted by the Branch in a very long time. The attendance was a record high, the guest speakers were interesting and engaging, and the location was perfect. Our Chapter Leaders left feeling more empowered and inspired, which was highlighted in the consistent feedback provided on the evaluation forms.

CONCOURS D'ART ORATOIRE

Once again this year, the Concours d'art oratoire provincial final brought together young people from across the country. Our 260 participants showed off their speaking skills in French while having fun and meeting peers from across the province.







BC FAMILY FRENCH CAMP

The Branch provided support to the BC Family French Camp. which gives children the opportunity to use French outside the classroom and to have fun doing it. But French Camp is more than that — it provides a real experience for the entire family in safe and friendly surroundings.

SHARING RESOURCES AND IDEAS

Throughout the year, the Branch shared resources and ideas with parents and families, to support French language learning at home. From places where adults can follow French classes to fun children's book ideas for summer reading, CPF used its website and social media platforms to support children and families who want to live, read, speak and play en français.

CANADIAN MOVIE DAY

On April 19, CPF BC & YK partnered with REEL Canada to provide an exciting French-language cultural opportunity for Chapters. The Branch provided \$200 to Chapters that host a "150 Canadian Film" screening in their local school, or community.

CHAPTER SUPPORT ACTIVITIES

The Outreach position, in conjunction with the CPF team, spent a significant amount of energy on intensifying and diversifying Chapter resources and assets. This included designing custom Chapter branding materials, new membership drive materials and resources, a shared google drive for Chapter resource sharing, emphasis on the Facebook leadership group, and ordering banners for all of the Chapters who requested one. We also designed and offered Chapter training modules to help new Board Members feel supported and oriented, and made these available online for the Network to access as needed.

TEACHER AWARD

The CPF BC & Yukon Teacher Award is valued at \$2,000. Up to two awards are granted each year. This year's selection was particularly challenging as many fine graduates had applied. The two winners for 2017 are:

- Andrea Brown, graduate of Simon Fraser University's PDP French module in Elementary French Immersion
- Katelyn Dyck, graduate of University of British Columbia's Secondary Core French Specialist Program

CPF BC & Yukon applauds their efforts and encourages more young people to consider going into teaching French as a career to facilitate the growth of FSL programs across BC & the Yukon.







VOLUNTEER APPRECIATION

Each year the Branch provides \$100 per CPF Chapter for Volunteer Appreciation Awards. This year six (6) awards were given to chapters to celebrate the contributions of their volunteers. Two Bouquet de Merci awards were presented at our Annual General Meeting in Kelowna.

VOLUNTEER TRAINING PROGRAMS

CPF BC & YK Hosted two (2) Volunteer Training Programs for CPF parent volunteers. The training program includes an online and offline component. The modules were hosted via Skype.

Government relations

In addition to the response to the Vancouver School Board cuts profiled earlier in this report, CPF BC & YK engaged in various advocacy and awareness-raising activities with decision makers throughout the year.

On April 20th, 2016 the Senate Standing Committee on Official Languages undertook a study of the challenges associated with access to French-language schools and French Immersion programs in British Columbia. CPF BC & YK participated in multiple roundtable discussions and submitted a full brief to help inform and influence the final report. In May of 2017, the committee co-chairs launched their final recommendations at Jules Verne elementary school in Vancouver. CPF BC & YK participated in the report launch, and spoke to the report recommendations. The report calls for increased funding for FSL programs and increased support for teacher training and retention. In the process, CPF BC & YK developed important relationships with the two committee co-chairs, Senator Claudette Tardif and Senator Raymonde Gagné.

In May, 2017, President Diane Tijman and Executive Director Glyn Lewis attended the BC School Trustee Association (BCSTA) Conference in Richmond, where they met with dozens of school trustees and key decision makers for FSL issues. CPF BC & YK also supported the Conseil Scolaire Francophone with their Motion #25, which calls on the BC Government to address the critical shortage of FFL and FSL Teachers.

Also in May, CPF BC & Yukon President Diane Tijman was in attendance for the release of the Senate of Canada - Sénat du Canada on Official Languages' report, Horizon 2018: Toward Stronger Support of French-language Learning in British Columbia.







In November, CPF BC & YK was invited to speak on a "Reimagining The Official Languages Act" panel hosted by the Office of the Commissioner of Official Languages in Ottawa.

During the year, Branch President Diane Tijman and Execeutive Director Glyn Lewis met with MP John Aldag twice to discuss Vancouver's French immersion cuts, teacher recruitment, and the next Federal Action Plan. Other activities included a call with MLA Adrian Dix (June 14th, 2017), a meeting with Yvon Godin, Executive Director of Educacentre (October 10th, 2017) and attending a presentation by former Commissioner on Official Languages Graham Fraser at SFU Harbour Centre (November 14th, 2017).

In January 2018, the Provincial Government announced \$240,000 in supplemental funding to SFU and UBC for 37 additional spaces in French teacher education programs. Moreover, the BC Ministry of Education made \$90,000 available to increase support for French preservice and in-service educators at UBC and SFU. Lastly, in the same announcement, the BC Government made available five (5) provincial bursaries of \$3,000 for prospective teachers from France, and ten (10) bursaries of \$1,250 for French teachers to relocate to Canada. Education Minister Rob Fleming followed up with a trip to France, Belgium and the Netherlands were University-to-University teacher exchange agreements were signed and travel subsidies were announced. CPF BC & YK co-drafted a media release with the BC Ministry of Education which was distributed just before the Minister left for Europe. Throughout the process, Minister Fleming invited to meet with with representatives of the Branch on two occasions and followed-up with a few direct phone calls. This highights a very positive and collaborative working relationship with the Minister and his team at the MOE.

ORGANIZATION Working together to continue building a dynamic, strong and effective pan-Canadian Network

Review of the Operational Strategic Action Plan

CPF BC & YK staff met to review and revise the Branch's Operational Strategic Action Plan. New projects and initiatives have been incorporated to focus on volunteer training, Chapter support and effective communication strategies and tools.

Building the Branch Team

Rowan Burdge started as the Branch's new Outreach Officer in the Spring of 2017. She has excelled in every capacity. We have already begun transitioning Rowan into a managerial role. She is now supervising and leading three contractors and employees: Digital Media Coordinator (Jensen Edwards), Graphic Design (Lisa Birrell), and Volunteer Training Lead (Zoe Welch). We have a plan in place to add a three day per week PT "Outreach Coordinator" to assist Rowan with Membership & Chapter Support.

Annual Membership Drive

Carried out in the Fall of 2017, the Branch's annual membership drive offered an opportunity to promote the work of CPF and recruit new members by sharing information and offering enticing prizes.

Collaborating with the CPF Network

Throughout the year, the Branch Executive Director, President and staff members participated in meetings and activities to support the broader CPF Network and facilitate the sharing of tools and resources from ocean to ocean.



In the Spring of 2016, CPF BC & YK hired a part time employee to assist operations with website management, graphic design, and digital engagement. This has increased the Branch's capacity to promote the benefits of bilingualism, to promote FSL programs, to promote extra-curricular opportunities and to support, engage and empower our key stakeholder groups.

The Branch's email database has grown from 12,463 to 14,453. It includes CPF Members, Educators, Decision Makers, Francophone Partners, and supporters at-large. It's a powerful tool that CPF BC & YK uses to communicate with -- and engage -- key audiences. CHAPTER SUPPORT

It was a busy year for Chapter outreach, including in person visits to 26 of our 40 Chapters, and meetings or specific support provided to 33 Chapters. We also had one new chapter startup in Prince George, and no chapter dissolutions this fiscal year (since Abbotsford in February, 2017).

Branch staff met in-person with representatives from 19 different CPF Chapters including: North Vancouver, Surrey, Langley, Yukon, Okanagan-Skaha, Kamloops, Vernon, Salmon Arm, Revelstoke, Cranbrook, Richmond, Saanich, Comox-Courtenay, Oceanside-Parksville, Victoria, Sooke, Tri-Cities, Burnaby and Nelson.

Outreach Officer Rowan Burdge spent four days in the Yukon, where she met with educators, school council members and CPF members. By learning more about issues in the region, including the future plans for French immersion, DELF and other student assessment tools, and changes to school calendars and how these may affect second language learning, Rowan and the Branch team will be better able to support members in the Yukon region.

Meetings and communications took place with parents in the following CPF Chapters to support them with their advocacy efforts for inclusive and quality FSL programs:

- * Hazelton (district has threatened to end high school FI in Gr 9 or 10 due to low enrolment)
- *Vernon (FI program capping)
- *Sooke (Federal French Funding allocation is not entirely transparent, parents have raised concerns)
- *Terrace (District has proposed to replace FI with the DELF)
- *Kitimat (District has proposed to replace FI with the DELF)
- *Bulkley Valley
- *Surrey (program capping)
- *Victoria (district has not assisted chapters to disseminate information to parents)
- *Penticton (effort to extend French Immersion to Summerland community)
- & Vancouver (one quarter of French Immersion program cut)



BOWEN ISLAND

Bowen Island is our newest Chapter and they are off to a phenomenal start. They are already planning a French Summer camp and after-school programming to kickstart more French activities for Bowen.

BULKLEY VALLEY

Bulkley Valley organized a successful Carnival, which included icebreaker boat races, Bonhomme bean bag toss, ball hockey, snow art paintings, and the ever popular horse sleigh rides and cabane a sucre (tire, hot chocolate and French musician). Carnival posters and resources were provided to teachers in both English and French classrooms. They also hosted a Concours, and Fana Sora offered drumming workshops, in addition to their persistent advocacy work.

BURNABY

The Burnaby Chapter hosted another wonderful film festival this past year, as well as a Skate with Bonhomme event that many families attended! The Burnaby chapter also has a French student initiative grant, French classes for parents, and hosted a "Fun in French" summer camp. They held a French Summer BBQ, gave graduate awards and hosted a Concours.



BURNS LAKE

Burns Lake had an amazing carnival and pancake breakfast at William Konkin Elementary school, where CPF volunteers served over 300 pancakes to children and families! They held a Poinsettia Fundraiser, Vazzy Workshop and a French Immersion Info Night, which were all successful events.

CHETWYND

Chetwynd had a tough year with the discontinuation of the French Immersion program. The Chapter continues to advocate for options to help students finish their degrees in French, particularly online and distance learning. They also hold 'Storytime en français' and movie nights.

COMOX-COURTENAY

Comox-Courtenay wowed us last year by winning our membership drive contest, achieving an increase of 218% in their district! They also put on French Classes for parents, a Cabane à Sucre and started up a Facebook page this year.

COWICHAN VALLEY

Cowichan Valley hosted a Carnival, a local Concours, and also offered elementary school cultural experiences. The Cowichan Valley Chapter attends FAC meetings, offered Citizenship Awards, as well as student bursaries.

CRANBROOK

Cranbrook held activities such as inviting the Maple Man, bringing in Anne Glover and Buddy Day. They hosted a local Concours, held a Santa Claus Parade and Bingo Fundraisers, as well as a members drive, and open houses in all 3 Cranbrook schoolsé

DAWSON CREEK

Dawson Creek hosted a fantastic family dinner and dance, met a fundraising goal with their 'Tombola' fundraiser, and brought in performer Will Stroet. They also hosted a local Concours, and sent 3 students to the provincial Concours. They held a graduation tea for French Immersion graduates. Dawson Creek also offers a bursary to French Immersion graduates.



DELTA

Delta held two Charlotte Diamond concerts this year. They organized a "French for Parents" course that attracted over a dozen parents, mostly parents of young FI students. They offered bursaries to graduating students. and celebrated their French Immersion graduates.

FORT ST. JOHN

Fort St. John is a relatively new Chapter, and tiey are working to increase membership and volunteers, as well as deepening their relationship with their PAC. They had a successful presentation at the "Welcome to Kindergarten" night this year.

GOLDEN

Golden ran their annual 'Éducation en français - French Summer Camps', and are working on getting new members and volunteers.

HAZELTON

Hazelton's Winter Carnival was one of highlights of the school year: students, parents and some community members engaged in French songs, food. celebration of Bonhomme and outdoor winter activities. Hazelton also hosted a Concours, and continued to advocate in their district to keep FSL programs supported and strong. They also hosted a year end French party.

WILLIAMS LAKE


