Canadian Parents for French is a nationwide, research-informed, volunteer organization that represents members across Canada and champions the opportunity to learn and use French for all those who call Canada home.

Canadian Parents for French was founded in 1977 by parents who wanted to ensure that children would have the opportunity to become bilingual in the Canadian school system.

Originally a small group of concerned parents who met in Ottawa, Canadian Parents for French has evolved into a proactive National Network with 12 Branches and offices and over 140 Chapters in communities nationwide.

In 2020-2021, in light of the worldwide pandemic, Canadian Parents for French worked together as a national network to lead initiatives in support of Canadian parents and FSL learners, shifting our focus to virtual programming and sharing resources beyond geographical barriers.

President's Message



If there is one thing that has become apparent in the past year and ▲ a half, it is that we are incredibly nimble and innovative. Can't meet in person? No problem, we'll meet online. Our conference will have to be cancelled? We will offer workshops and social events online instead. We'd like to meet with Senators and Members of Parliament to discuss modernization of the Official Languages Act? Zoom to the rescue!

In all seriousness, it has been a challenging but successful year for the BC and Yukon Branch.

Here are just a few of the highlights:

- Thanks to our national office removing membership fees for almost a year, our branch had over 11,000 members at the end of March 2021, an increase of about 5,000 from the previous year. We are so pleased to introduce these new members to Canadian Parents for French. Learning French is more than simply classroom learning; CPF BC & Yukon's French camps, cultural events, and public speaking contests bring French to life! And parents know our Branch staff advocate for strong French Second Language programs at every level of government.
- Our online French tutoring pilot program, free to members and led by volunteers, commenced in the fall and saw 62 families representing almost 100 kids sign up within a few hours. The program was to wind down by Spring Break, but demand was so high, it continued through to the end of May so that waitlisted families could participate.
- Our brilliant staff held a virtual conference in January 2021 and there were almost the same number of attendees as our face-to-face conferences. Feedback was so positive that another mini online conference was held in June, which was equally as informative for our chapters.
- In May 2021 we were fortunate to meet with Senator Mobina Jaffer to discuss modernization of the Official Languages Act. A champion of Canada's linguistic bilingualism, Senator Jaffer continually advocates measures to advance the use of English and French in communities across Canada.

It is a great honour to be involved with CPF. I am constantly in awe of the dedication and passion so many people give to this organization. I would like to offer my sincere thanks to the incredible volunteers who worked tirelessly to provide online French tutoring to students, to our dedicated chapters who supported local initiatives and to our remarkable staff who offered myriad socio-cultural events, chapter training sessions and advocacy support, all while working from home. I would also like to acknowledge the tireless support of the national office and my fellow branch board members

Concours virtuel 2020

With in-person Concours d'art oratoire cancelled due to COVID, instead of reciting their traditional Concours speeches on camera, we asked students to share what their daily lives looked like during lockdown. This pivot to a virtual contest was spearheaded by the BC and Yukon Branch and became an event open to students across the country.


With the goal of helping students feel less isolated, Concours virtuel invited them to share their experiences though video presentations. The hashtag #EnsembleÀDistance ("Together from afar") represented this sentiment. We wanted to help students feel connected to one another, even though most were not only far from their friends, but also required to adapt to online learning. *Concours virtuel* also offered a valuable chance for students to practise their French, as many had little exposure to French while stuck at home.

In their videos, students shared many ways their lives were impacted

or how disappointed they were by the cancellation of events and trips they'd been looking forward to. Many shared positive stories of making the best of the lockdown, and encouraged their peers to keep their spirits up during this difficult time.

The videos showcased an impressive array of skills students had practised during lockdown: cooking, baking, painting, dance, music, exercise, gardening, and much more. Many were also helping their communities, from doing chores around their home, to sewing face masks for front-line workers and volunteering at food banks.

Concours virtuel was a huge success: students from across Canada submitted over 900 video entries, all en français!

French Immersion Celebration Week with Will's Jams

For French Immersion Celebration week, Will Stroet of Will's Jams performed two live-streamed concerts, and even debuted two new songs. 5,181 students from 219 classes and 84 families signed up to attend the concerts.

Virtual Spring Break Camp

During the second week of spring break, CPF BCYK hosted a full week of 19 wide-ranging activities for all ages of students, including a cooking class, morning Zumba lessons, bird watching bingo, and a concert by the legendary Charlotte Diamond, to name a few. **515 families** joined us throughout the week, for a total of 829 participants.

CPF Virtual French Tutoring Program

As students across Canada moved to stay-at-home learning and online classes, French Second Language students were among those most impacted. The conditions added a whole new layer of challenges to learning a new language, both for the students, as well as for the parents supporting their children, but especially for parents who do not speak French.

The CPF Tutoring Program was developed in the spring, with CPF BC & Yukon taking part in the pilot program. The goal of the program was to address immediate needs arising from the COVID-19 situation: to provide students with homework support at a distance; and to support teachers who were adapting to the new realities of stay-at-home learning.

For Fall 2020 / Winter 2021, CPF National expanded the program to support approximately 500 students between the ages of 6 and 14 years, residing in nine provinces, with more than 400 volunteer tutors. CPF National established protocols to offer Branches full support in screening volunteers and matching them with students who requested a French-speaking tutor.

Children spend one hour per week in a one-on-one session with a French-speaking volunteer tutor. As sessions are virtual, a computer, camera, microphone and internet connection are required. This is not an academic program following a pre-determined curriculum. The pairs can work on whatever skills are identified as needing improvement or the homework of the week. Also, registered students have the opportunity to join small group conversations and book clubs

- All respondents indicated that no caregiver in the home speaks French.
- 22% of families indicated that neither French nor English
- 84% of respondents indicated that they were not able to financially afford a tutor (the question did not specify if this was due to recent events causing financial hardship or an on-going need).

CPF MEMBERSHIP EXTENSION

hortly after COVID-19 emerged, the decision was made nationally to offer free memberships to new and renewing members during what was a very unstable time for many. The Branch seized this opportunity to focus on growing our member base and highlighting the benefits of joining CPF BC & Yukon.

In order to continue to fund our Chapters who rely so much on membership rebate monies to continue activities, the Branch created a subsidy of \$20 paid to the Chapter for each new member that signed up during the free membership period. This resulted in over \$17,000 paid to Chapters around BC and Yukon, directed from the unspent travel budget.

BEGINNER FRENCH CLASSES FOR PARENTS

We were pleased to be able to offer sessions of Beginner French Classes for Parents to our members during the past year. The classes were taught virtually by Elia Durand, instructor with Alternative French and the feedback was excellent. The first group progressed onto Level 2 and we hope that everyone is finding it much easier to help with their children's homework after attending these classes.

CONNECTING WITH CHAPTERS DIFFERENTLY

Since travel has been on hold for most of the year, the Outreach Team quickly realized that it was necessary to connect with Chapters in a different way. We planned quarterly mini-conferences that were open to all to attend and focused on training, support and connections. A highlight was the presentation by Dr. Jason Cressey on Resilience during the pandemic.



Chapter Highlights



CPF Nanaimo-Ladysmith: This Chapter organized a group of youth who filmed three French cooking videos which were shared on their Chapter's YouTube channel and promoted by the local school districts. The videos were followed by a Kahoots trivia game to test the chefs in-training on their newly acquired vocabulaire. In order to learn about the local First Nations culture, students took part in a French scavenger hunt. Students who participated had to first solve riddles and then take photos of the clues in order to be entered to win prizes. The Chapter partnered with businesses in the community who donated the prizes. What a great way to collaborate!

CPF North Vancouver: The district continued the tradition of Concours. Although held virtually, winners were awarded beautiful wooden medals designed specifically for the event.

CPF Okanagan-Skaha: The French immersion Grads from Okanagan-Skaha were still able to celebrate with the support of the local CPF Chapter. Students were honoured for achieving the Dual Dogwood Diploma while playing games and doing activities in French. Each graduate went home with a sweet maple treat in recognition of their accomplishment.

CPF Prince Rupert: The Chapter had students help to develop content for their Chapter's Facebook page. This was in the form of two videos entitled Bonjour Prince Rupert!, which were recorded by French immersion youth and touched on life during the pandemic. The links were shared with local media and key community stakeholders. What a fun way to get young people involved with the Chapter.

CPF Quesnel: During French Immersion Week in Quesnel, the French immersion schools got together to celebrate the diversity of French language and each class presented about a different country around the world where French is spoken. The event included on-line workshops presented by Theatre La Seizieme and created connections by enabling classes from elementary, middle and high school to meet virtually.







Chapter Highlights

CPF Vancouver: By partnering with schools in the district, the Chapter was able to host various virtual socio-cultural workshops including Just Aissi's gumboot dance activity, an interactive program offered by the Cosmodome in Montreal, as well as a performance by TiBert le Voyageur. The workshops were enjoyed by all and the funding helped out local schools.

CPF Saanich: Volunteers got creative around the region this year to bring cultural events to their students and encourage them as they grapple with a new world of virtual education. CPF Saanich pivoted from their traditional Kindergarten/Grade 12 gift exchange, which allows the youngest students to connect with the graduating class in a memorable way, and found another way to send their grads on their way. They made a celebration video featuring Branch president Nancy Taylor and images from the students, from the day they entered Kindergarten to their final days in Grade 12 French class. The Saanich Chapter also hosted karate workshops in French in partnership with a local business, as well as a new Zumba class.

CPF Victoria: An annual tradition for the Victoria Chapter is to award four \$250 prizes to outstanding students from the French immersion graduating class. When applying for the award, students are asked to answer questions about their experiences with French and the advice they would give to a student entering the Late French immersion program.

CPF Castlegar: Although a smaller Chapter, CPF Castlegar had many successes this past year and is hoping to encourage more parents to join in the coming school year. Their initiatives included developing their Facebook page, running a successful fundraiser with West Coast Seeds and encouraging French in the community by handing out French learning materials through the local library. Bonhomme Carnaval visited the West Kootenays in November, thanks to an invitation from CPF Castlegar. The Chapter took their local students on a virtual scavenger hunt, asking students to identify where Bonhomme popped up in photos around town for a chance to win a prize. We love the idea - merci, CPF Castlegar! Other Chapters such as Delta and Okanagan-Skaha replicated the idea in their communities too, with great success!



Chapter Highlights

CPF South Cariboo: Volunteers with CPF South Cariboo took the idea of free virtual tutoring and ran with it. In winter 2020-21, they launched their own Afterschool French Activities & Language Club which was 100% French language and culture for local students. A Christmas fundraiser even allowed the Chapter to raise enough money to pay its tutors – local high school seniors or recent grads – to support the program's students.

In addition, the local winter Carnaval went ahead but on Zoom this year. The highlight was French baking classes taught by Grade 12 students which encouraged family participation. Ski lift tickets were reimbursed for students who submitted a poem or essay in French about how they enjoy winter. The organizers hope to keep some of the successful virtual activities going, even when things are back to normal again.

CPF Burns Lake: It took more than a year of advocacy, research and drumming up support for French immersion in their community, but CPF Burns Lake began to see the results of their efforts in March 2021. At that point, their advocacy had nearly tripled Kindergarten registration for the program starting Sept. 2021, when compared to previous years' numbers. We are so proud of, and thankful for, their efforts.

CPF Richmond: We know language learners are talented and bright, but CPF Richmond allowed many of their local students the chance to shine even brighter with CPF Richmond Idol Singing Contest. Students sent in videos of themselves singing French-language songs and the results were incredible. If only we could have seen them sing in person — there would have been encores and standing ovations galore!

CPF ADVOCACY IN ACTION I

The Pandemic's Effect on Access to French **Immersion Education**

hen schools first closed down due to the pandemic, hundreds of parents reached out to us inquiring about online learning courses in French. Many school districts offered online courses in English, but not in French. This highlighted a problematic discrepancy.


With our support, parents started sending letters to the Minister of Education calling for more virtual and distributed learning in French. In all, roughly 120 emails were sent with our support from 16 different BC communities.

We believe French immersion programs suffered during the pandemic, in part, because these online courses were not available. We've heard of parents who transferred their children to the English program where online courses are more accessible and better supported.

The BC Government is currently preparing to launch "Online Public Schools" for the 2022/2023 school year. This planning is in an early phase. We have already begun collaborative conversations with the BC Ministry of Education about the courses that will be available in these online schools to ensure the needs of the province's French immersion students are met.



Decreases in French Immersion Enrolment



nfortunately, French immersion enrolment fell for the first time in over 20 years this past school year. This decrease mirrored a decline in overall enrolment. According to the BC Ministry of Education overall enrolment fell, largely because non-resident students were unable to travel or stay in British Columbia due to the pandemic. Parents have told us they withdrew their children from the French immersion program because of the lack of online and distributed French courses. This is of grave concern to our Branch.

We intend to work closely with the Ministry of Education to ensure there are robust online options en français not only for students learning from home during the COVID-19 pandemic, but for all students regardless of where they live. It has been a challenge for rural and remote school districts to offer French immersion classes through to Grade 12. This has deprived many learners the opportunity to graduate with the Dual Dogwood. The new Online Public Schools could ensure that very student, regardless of where they live, has the opportunity to learn French and access the French as a second language program that meets their needs and aspirations.





Executive Director's Message



This year we have had to pivot to adjust to the many changes that have come our way. The office is closed and the staff team continues to work remotely from home. Travel continues to be suspended, as the public health orders are currently asking us not to leave our neighbourhoods. All that being said, we have had a very productive year, and managed to reach our membership through virtual events, online programming and social media.

Increasing FSL Youth Access and Participation

 We launched our free, volunteer, virtual tutoring program this year, which continued until spring break. Our pilot was in the fall, and we had 100 kids sign up within a few hours.

Building Member, Volunteer, Donor Engagement

 We held a virtual conference in January with some fantastic speakers who spoke to advocacy, engaging local decision makers, social and digital media, succession planning and volunteer burnout, and more. We also played a fun and engaging trivia game.

Advocating for Universal Access to Programs

 Key priorities highlighted were the teacher shortage (recruitment and retention), access to at-home, virtual, and hybrid learning options, and the need to require French Advisory Committees for districts to receive Federal French Funds.

Building Leadership Expertise

 We are continually working on leadership opportunities for our chapter volunteers, such as the chapter training modules, mini-conferences and our Facebook leadership group.

As we look forward to the year ahead, we hope for continued growth in our membership, expansion of opportunities for youth and the on-going support from our partners and funders.


